Annexure (i): Maintaining Eco-friendly campus

The college conducts a Green Audit of its Campus. Since inception, the College has considered Green Audit as an integral exercise to be accounted for in all developmental plans. As new buildings came up, the management made conscientious efforts to sustain the eco–friendly campus. The trees were felled judiciously to provide room for expansion of the institution. Even now the campus retains extensive green lungs of trees under which open air meetings can be held for the entire community, leading to the popular naming of our institute by Madurites as the *Shantiniketan of Madurai*.

- Around 1000 trees are maintained in the campus.
- Bio-fertilizers are used.
- The College has a policy to plant a few saplings before felling a tree.
- The College employs a few persons for periodic pruning of the trees and the plants.
- Herbal gardens are maintained.

- As an effort towards creating awareness on plantation, the students are encouraged to plant saplings in their homes following the policy of 'one house, one tree'. Saplings are distributed in the villages adopted for community service.
- The prime agenda of the **Green club** is to give awareness on environmental issues. The club organizes **Plantation Day** and not only plants trees in the campus but also supplies saplings to the students. It also organizes exhibitions of saplings for plantation.
- The College observes **Earth Day, Ozone Day** and **Environmental Day** and on these occasions meaningful exercises like tableau/ poster presentation, taking out rallies on campus and turning off fans and lights for an hour are undertaken.
- The **Environmental Education Cell** organizes lectures on environmental issues.

Computer assisted Learning:

- 1. As the departments have well developed e-content for all courses, knowledge flow to the learners is facilitated.
- 2. Most classrooms are fitted with LCD projectors and used for interactive sessions and power point presentations.
- 3. Well equipped language laboratories, audiovisual rooms and smart class rooms are put to effective use. The language lab is used to enhance communication skills, a much needed ability for placement. These rooms with computer facilities are extensively used by different departments and equitable usage is ensured by the college office.
- 4. CAD (Computer Aided Design) and CBT (Computer Based Training) are regularly used.
- 5. The central library has an impressive collection of educational CDs to supplement class room teaching.
